

# Hexagon Flower Scissors Case

Thank you for downloading my free pattern. I hope you love making it. I designed this simple case because I have so many pairs of embroidery scissors and really needed little cases to keep them safe. I can't wait to make some more and to make matching hexagon needle books. too!

The case is big enough to fit a standard pair of stork embroidery scissors which are 3 1/2 inches long, but don't forget you can enlarge the pattern to make it any size you wish, just remember to adjust the amount of fabric and bias binding you will need.

# Tools and Materials

## You will need:

- General sewing kit: needle, scissors, thread, embroidery thread
- Sewline glue pen, pins, wonder clips.
- 8" x 6" Linen or cotton for the exterior of the case
- 8" x 6" Felt for the interior
- 8" x 6" Foam or wadding to add structure. I like Vilene style-vil foam, it is approx. 1/4" thick.
- Bias binding 32" long, 1 1/4" wide (when the folds are opened out) I cut a 1 1/4" strip of fabric on the bias and pressed the edges in by 1/4" to make my own.
- A small snap fastener (about 8mm)
- Fabric scraps to make the flower
- 7 x 3/8" hexagon paper or hexiform shapes (or 6 x 3/8" hex petals and 1 x 3/8" hexagon)
- 2 x 1/2" honeycomb paper or hexiform shapes



# Instructions

1. Print out the templates and cut out. Cut 2 oval shapes from linen, felt and foam.



2. Make your hexagon flower using your preferred English paper piecing method. I like to glue baste my shapes and whip stitch them together. Baste your honeycomb leaves and your stem but don't stitch them together.

If using paper, spray your flower and leaves with starch and press with an iron. Remove the papers. Skip this stage if you are using hexiform.



3. Layer the linen on top of the foam and hold in place with glue or pins. Glue your hexagon flower in place, placing the stem under the bottom hexagon and folding the bottom edge under. Position the leaves next to the stem. Applique in place.



4. Place the felt on the back and pin to hold. Take your bias binding, unfold the edge and line up with the raw edges. Hold in place with clips all of the way round, making sure to turn in one end of you bias to hide the raw edge, and to overlap the other end inside. Machine stitch in place using 1/4" seam allowance.





5. Turn the binding to the wrong side and stitch down in place.



6. Sew a snap fastener onto the felt side, at the top, in the middle.



7. Layer up the linen, foam and felt for the back of the case. Attach the binding as in steps 4, 5 and 6. Add the other half of the fastener.

8. Place both halves of the case together with the felt sides facing each other. Use clips to hold in place. Ladder stitch the two halves together, leaving an opening at the top wide enough for your scissors to fit in.

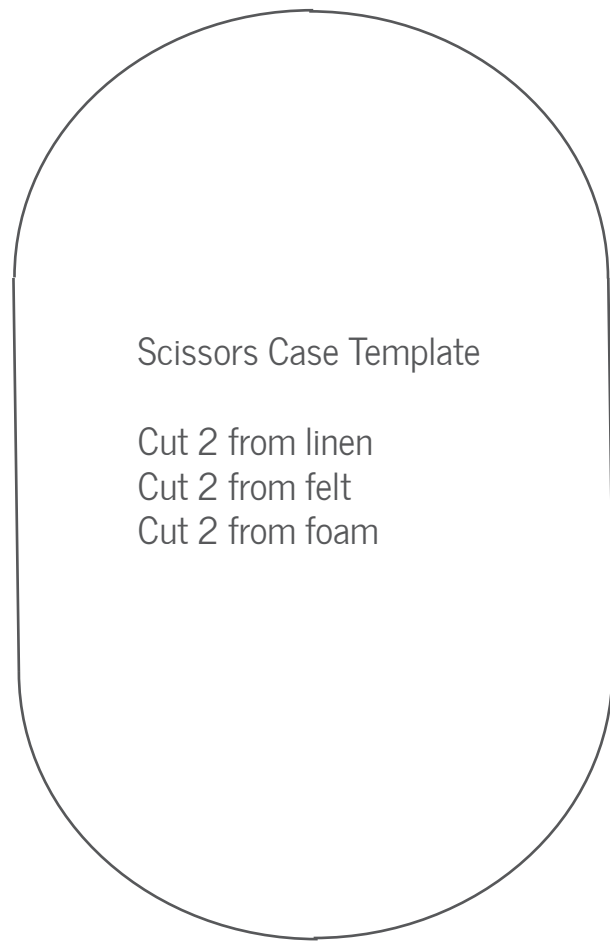

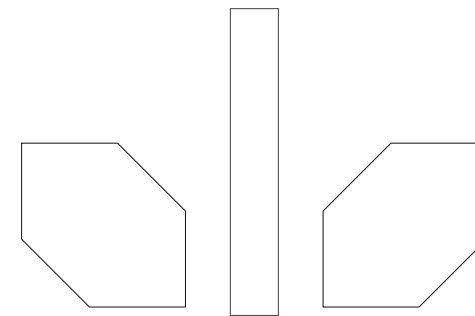
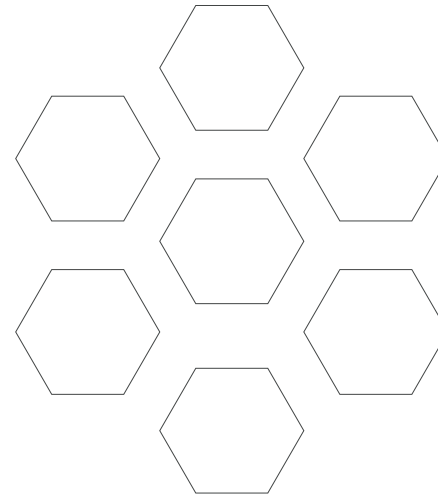


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3/8" hexagons
